


CITY OF SALINE HISTORY

The City of Saline's history dates back to the early 19th century when Indigenous peoples gathered salt from its natural springs, later attracting French explorers who named the nearby river Saline. In 1825, surveyor Orange Risdon recognized the area's agricultural potential and recruited settlers, leading to Saline's official platting in 1832. The arrival of the Detroit-Hillsdale & Indiana Railroad in 1870 spurred further growth, and by 1931, Saline was incorporated as a city.

Today, Saline blends its historic charm with a forward-looking approach to development, fostering a thriving economy rooted in manufacturing, healthcare, and education. The city's leadership remains committed to strategic growth, ensuring that public services, housing, and community engagement initiatives support its evolving needs while maintaining strong fiscal responsibility.

ABOUT THE POSITION

The City Manager is charged with overseeing all activities and services provided by the City of Saline.

Specific Duties & Responsibilities:

- Serves as final operating authority for budget, establishing the priorities of programs in relationship to income, authorizing expenditures, and developing funding mechanisms.
- Approves purchases in conformance with City ordinances and established purchasing procedures.
- Recommends purchases for approval by City Council.
- Develops purchasing directives for City department heads and policies for City Council approval.
- Regularly works with local partners on developing and implementing projects and ideas.
- Works with City's Business Ambassador, other staff, and local partners regarding economic development activities, including recruiting new businesses and retaining existing businesses.
- Works with developers interested in bringing residential, commercial, and industrial development to Saline.
- Negotiates labor contracts with collective bargaining groups; Oversees the administration of those contracts, including the settlement of grievances.
- Responsible for presenting a six-year Capital Improvement Program Budget to maintain and improve the community's infrastructure to Council annually.
- Determines broad policy for operating departments, recommends to Council, department heads, and all other employees.
- Monitors activities for conformance to Council mandates, departmental objectives, and community needs.
- Regularly conducts staff meetings to coordinate departmental activities, receive progress and general briefing reports, and to identify and develop solutions to problems.
- Responds to correspondence and telephone inquiries relating to City operations, policies, and postions of a variety of issues.
- Develops personnel policies for recommendation to City Council. Hires, counsels, and, when necessary, terminates City employees.
- Directs the purchase, utilization, maintenance, and control of City-owned land, buildings, and equipment.
- Proposes funding mechanisms, ordinances, and zoning regulations to the City Council in the interest of orderly community growth and development.
- Conducts annual personnel performance evaluations, and quarterly check-ins, for all department heads and City Manager's office staff.
- Prepares, or directs the preparation of, special studies and reports as requested by the Council.
 Reviews and presents analyses and findings and makes recommendations on appropriate actions.
- Monitors proposed legislation at the state and federal level and recommends policy positions with respect to proposals which affect municipalities in general and the City of Saline in particular.
- Interacts extensively with federal, state, and county government representatives to coordinate programs, funding, information, and legislation related to a variety of common interests.
- Meets with citizens and community groups on a variety of topics related to municipal administration.
- Regular and routine onsite attendance.

CHALLENGES

- Wastewater Treatment Investment: Saline has committed nearly \$80 million toward the rehabilitation of its wastewater treatment plant, a cornerstone project within the City's \$163 million Capital Improvement Plan through 2030. While critical for long-term infrastructure reliability, this large-scale initiative presents challenges related to construction impacts, sewer rates, and neighborhood disruptions that will require steady leadership and proactive communication.
- Dam and Water Infrastructure: The City is actively evaluating the future of the Saline River Dam, a structure dating back to the late 1930s. With structural concerns now identified, a feasibility study is underway to weigh options including rehabilitation or removal. In parallel, the City's broader water system will need thoughtful reinvestment to ensure environmental sustainability and long-term service reliability.
- **Fire and Emergency Services:** The Saline Area Fire Department (SAFD) is facing rising operational costs, staffing pressures, and long-term planning needs. While a recent strategic plan outlines goals like station upgrades and workforce expansion, the City must develop a sustainable model, either by supporting the SAFD or exploring alternative service delivery options, to meet growing community expectations.
- Recreation Center Viability: The Saline Rec Center is a vital community asset, but rising maintenance needs and declining membership trends call for renewed attention. The next City Manager will help assess long-term sustainability options and identify strategies to increase engagement and financial viability.
- Aging Infrastructure: From roads and bridges to underground utilities, Saline's aging infrastructure
 demands continued investment. Like many legacy communities, the City must navigate funding
 constraints while prioritizing upgrades that support growth, maintain service quality, and enhance longterm resilience.
